Dear Families and Friends,

I have enjoyed a wonderful week 9, visiting classrooms, teaching dance to years 3/4 and visiting camp with our year 5/6 students. We also had a visit from Anita Chin a maths consultant who works with schools all over Australia and she provided professional learning to our teachers in January. This week she worked with teachers in classrooms, demonstrating lessons and providing additional learning on Tuesday afternoon. Our teachers will now take what they have seen and learnt to continue to build upon our whole school practices in maths, developing our use of mathematical language and working across teams in our future planning.

Another consultant we have enjoyed working with is Kath Murdoch who works across the world helping teachers to teach using inquiry, creative thinking and problem solving. Kath is the consultant who challenged us to take the word 'work' out of our school vocabulary and use the word 'learning' instead. Recently she shared some great advice on helping children develop these skills simply by thinking

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about the language we use when children are playing and may need to think about how to be careful and remain safe. I thought I would share an excerpt with you as we head towards the holidays.

What we can say instead of telling our kids to “Be Careful”

Saying “Be Careful!” to children can be unhelpful to them. First of all, it’s **not specific enough**. “Be Careful!” could mean anything, including “watch out the sky is falling!” and often doesn’t get the response you’re hoping for. They may give you a look of confusion (“What’s there to be afraid of?”), ignore you (“This isn’t scary!”) or start crying (“Something really bad is about to happen!”). Telling children to be careful can also instil fear and may teach kids that they should avoid taking risks, trying new things and making mistakes because bad things could happen. Yes, bad things can happen, but kids need to engage in risky and challenging play for healthy growth and development.

What To Do and Say Instead

Every time you want to say, “Be Careful!” see it as an opportunity to help your child foster greater awareness of their environment and their bodies. Try saying:

- **Notice how...** these rocks are slippery, the log is rotten, that branch is strong.
- **Do you see...** the poison ivy, your friends nearby?
- **Try moving...** your feet slowly, carefully, quickly, strongly.
- **Try using your...** hands, feet, arms, legs.
- **Can you hear...** the rushing water, the singing birds, the wind?
- **Do you feel...** stable on that rock, the heat from the fire?
- **Are you feeling...** scared, excited, tired, safe?

Your prompts can also help to encourage problem solving, by letting them engage in risky or challenging play and providing ideas to help them practice problem solving skills. Help them out by asking:

- **What’s your plan...** if you climb that boulder, cross that log?
- **What can you use...** to get across, for your adventure?
- **Where will you...** put that rock, climb that tree, dig that hole?
- **How will you....** get down, go up, get across?
- **Who will...** be with you, go with you, help you if?

ACT Parents and Citizens and the Education Directorate working together for safer schools.

Building Strong and Safe Communities for Learning is a partnership project between the ACT Education Directorate and the ACT Council of Parents and Citizens Associations (P&C). It focuses on all of us - parents, students, principals and teachers - working together to reduce violence and bullying in schools. An initial workshop discussed the key issues, what is working well or not working well, and who contributes to these. A second workshop with representatives of the P&C Council and the Education Directorate considered the outcomes of the first workshop to help prepare for further conversations with our school community.

We want to make it easy for anyone who wants to have a say to be given the opportunity to be involved. There are two remaining workshops you may wish to attend:

- On 9 May 2019, 8:30am – 4:30pm the workshop will explore the key question “*How might we reduce and respond to violence in schools and co-create strong and safe communities for learning?*”.
- In June 2019 a 2 – 3 hour showcase will highlight what we have learned. It will enable participants to attend at different times during the day.

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Transport and City Services – Surveys

School travel and safety survey

Transport Canberra and City Services has engaged First Person Consulting to conduct research into parents' attitudes to their children's active travel to and from schools. Part of this is investigating the role that crossing supervisors have in improving safety around schools, and the extent to which parent's attitudes to children travelling actively change as a result. Feedback requested – Active Streets

The Active Streets for Schools program is an infrastructure program – supported by educational resources – to make it safer and easier for children to walk or ride to school. We are lucky that our school will be supported by the program over the next four years. Active Streets helps to make school environments safer and more accessible by providing a range of tailored solutions depending on the school and local environment. Improvements may include new or improved footpath connections, more dedicated crossings or traffic calming (e.g. speed humps) to ensure the trip is safe and easy for children to navigate.

To commence the program, Transport Canberra and City Services (TCCS) would like to discover how children currently travel to and from school and find out where you think improvements can be made around the suburb and the school. TCCS have set up a [survey](#) to gather this information. All the information collected will be de-identified and confidential. The final survey question asks about the type of infrastructure improvements our community would like considered through the program. To complete this question you can either:

- Provide an explanation in the text field in the survey, or
- Drop a pin on our [Ride or Walk to School map](#) and provide a comment

To drop a pin on the map, you will need to be signed in to a Google account, which is as simple as signing up if you don't already have one. More information about setting up an account and dropping a pin on the map is available in [these instructions](#). TCCS will also welcome feedback about our Ride or Walk to School map, so please use the drop pin feature to comment on the highlighted routes. Changes to public transport



From the beginning of Term 2, the ACT Government will be introducing the new integrated public transport network which will include bus and light rail services operating together. As part of this upgrade, the way students will get to school by public transport will change from Term 2, 2019. Some students will use different routes, make connections between services or use light rail for the first time. Every student who will use public transport needs to be aware of the changes.

What do you need to know?

Bus services will change for the beginning of Term 2.

- The change to services will include dedicated school services for the commencement of Term 2 on 29 April 2019.
- The new timetable information will be available on line from early March, including an improved online journey planner.
- Information about services for each school is available online at www.transport.act.gov.au/getting-around/new-network/schools.
- Light rail services are being tested now and you can find out more about safety for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers around light rail online at www.canberra-metro.com.au/safety.
